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7. AIMS & OBJECTIVES

- 1) To help students relate at a philosophical level the themes in linguistics that cut across disciplines;
- 2) To broaden students' perspectives on the properties of their discipline by placing it in the large context of academic inquiry;
- 3) To cultivate courage in students to approach issues outside their field of training; and
- 4) To cultivate rigor in attempting to understand issues that lie beyond their field of training.

8. COURSE CONTENT

- I. Themes from the Phenomenal World
- a. Rhythm (e.g. prosody, visual arrangement, bio-rhythms, cyclicity, music)
- b. Identity and Metamorphosis (e.g. writing, speech, architecture and renovations, biological transformation, energy)
- c. Morphology (e.g. word, biological, geographical morphology)
- d. Beauty (e.g. art, biological sexuality, nudity, decorations, might, weakness, linguistic expressions from ode to expletive)

- e. Love, Compassion and Attraction (e.g. love in literature, gravitation, sexual selection)
- f. Equality and Equilibrium (e.g. Distribution of wealth, Jekyll & Hyde, moments in physics, ecological stability)
- g. Freedom, Chaos and Order
- h. Hunger, Desire and Needs (e.g., valence, drives, instinct)
- II. Themes from Tools for Construction and Understanding of Reality
- a. Analysis and Diagnosis
- b. Truth Myth, Superstition, Faith and Guesses
- c. Evidence and Argumentation
- d. Gedank experiment & creativity

Themes listed above are neither exhaustive nor restrictive, but are rather intended to be exemplary. The choice of themes may differ from semester to semester depending on interest.

Type of Assessment Methods	Weighting	CILOs to be addressed	Description of Assessment Tasks
Learning Journals	30 %	1, 2	Three learning journals assess students abilities to summarize and organize clas discussions, as well as to reflect on them.
Active Participation	15 %	1, 3	Students are required to participate actively in class or through the Moodle forum to articulate and evaluate different viewpoints.
Seminar Presentation	25 %	1, 2, 3	Students are to give a conference style presentation that articulates empirical motivations for the exploration of a chosen theme, and then provide an account for in a chosen perspective.
Term Paper	30 %	2, 3, 4	The term paper requires students to identify a theme and provide both humantistic and scientific perspectives on that theme.

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
